RECIPES - RECIPES - RECIPES - RECIPES - RECIPES - RECIPES - RECIPES Amish Friendship Bread Starter Mix

Make friendship bread starter mix and share some with a friend!

Ingredients

- 1 (.25 ounce) package active dry yeast
- ¹/₄ cup warm water (110 degrees F/45 degrees C)
- 3 cups all-purpose flour, divided
- 3 cups white sugar, divided
- 3 cups milk, divided

Directions

Step 1. Dissolve yeast in warm water in a small bowl; let stand until foamy, about 10 minutes.

Step 2. Combine 1 cup flour and 1 cup sugar in a 2-quart container (glass, plastic, or ceramic); mix thoroughly. Stir in 1 cup milk and yeast mixture. Cover the container loosely and leave at room temperature until bubbly. This is day 1 of the 10-day process.

Step 3. Days 2 through 4: Stir starter with a spoon. Day 5: Stir in 1 cup flour, 1 cup sugar, and 1 cup milk. Days 6 through 9: Stir starter with a spoon.

Step 4. Day 10: Stir in remaining 1 cup flour, 1 cup sugar, and 1 cup milk. Remove 1 cup starter to make your first bread. Give 2 cups starter to friends (1 cup each) along with this recipe. Store remaining 1 cup starter in a container in the refrigerator or begin the 10-day process over again (beginning with step 2).

Editor's Notes:

You can also freeze the starter in 1 cup measures for later use. Frozen starter will take at least 3 hours at room temperature to thaw before using.

Extreme Winter Weather Reminders from HHA/FHA Management

PARKING LOT — The City of Hooper's maintenance department is kindly willing to clear heavy snow from the Parkview Apartment parking lot area sometime during their clearing of Hooper streets. It is necessary for everyone to have their vehicles moved for them to be able to do this efficiently. They will not clear the lot if <u>any</u> vehicles remain. Timing of having your vehicle moved *depends on you being alert to their* movements when clearing the streets! Listen and watch for them. The City and HHA employees will likely not work during storms or until the snowing/blowing/drifting has mostly subsided. So sidewalks, entry areas, etc. will not be shoveled by housing staff until it is safe to do so and when it will make a lasting difference. **REMEMBER:** USE CAUTION & PATIENCE!! Watch the weather forecast and *stock up beforehand*. If you don't **need** to be out, don't take risks, stay home! It's safer for you and potential rescue workers!! Having patience during this time is appreciated and commendable!!
